The deadline for filing an application is June 1, 2010. Funding is expected to begin October 1, 2010.

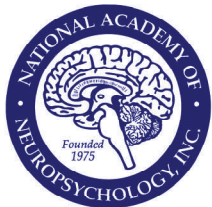
The applicant must be in a setting that will facilitate the proposed research, but no preference will be given to those with academic or research affiliations.

NAN CLINICAL RESEARCH GRANTS PROGRAM

The National Academy of Neuropsychology is committed to the professional and scientific development of clinical neuropsychology. The mission of the Clinical Research Grants Program is to support meritorious research which, because of its applied clinical nature, might be overlooked by traditional granting agencies.

Characteristics of Projects to be Supported

Projects will be selected on the basis of their potential to assist practicing neuropsychologists in daily clinical work. These might include (but are not limited to) projects that:

Produce new, clinically relevant knowledge

e.g. identifying non-cognitive factors that contaminate test findings; enhancing returns with limited batteries; or providing data on under-studied populations

Address perceived deficiencies in the field

e.g. effects of psychiatric disorders on neuropsychological test performance; effects of cultural factors on performance

Deal with professional issues

e.g. improving collections on billings; resolving ethical problems and enhancing professional relationships in adversarial settings

Identify new uses and applications of neuropsychological procedures

e.g., application of neuropsychological testing in nontraditional settings; or web-based testing

Target Issues of Diversity

NAN will be awarding a grant that is targeted in the area of diversity, broadly defined (including gender, cultural, physical/sensory disabilities and sexual orientation).

All grants will be funded for one year. Maximum awards are \$15,000, with economical projects given priority consideration. Awardees are required to submit results for publication in *Archives of Clinical Neuropsychology*.

Grant Evaluation Criteria

Grant proposals will be evaluated on the following criteria:

Research Idea – originality, importance to clinical practice

Research Methodology – soundness of design, availability of subjects

Ability to Complete Project – background of the principal investigator in the application area and resources to complete research

Economy of Project – return to the profession for the number of dollars expended

Awards

Grants are awarded to neuropsychologists employed in private practice, institutional, and academic settings. Applicants must be members of NAN.

NAN board members, NAN committee chairs, and their family members may not apply.
